

MINISTER'S LETTER

Earlier this month our Kirk Session held an 'away day' - or at least part of a day - at the Learning Centre in the newly refurbished Abbey Strand building just outside the main gate of the Palace of Holyroodhouse. The Abbey Strand has a wonderfully varied history, from its earliest days in the late fifteenth century when it possibly served as a mansion for the Abbot of Holyrood Abbey, to the nineteenth and twentieth centuries when it housed a lively mix of shops, pubs, tearooms and crowded lodgings. The St James Quarter of its day?! In between, it provided sanctuary to over 6,500 individuals taking refuge from their debtors, and before that, during the reigns of Mary, Queen of Scots, and James VI, courtiers and ambassadors stayed there when the monarch was in residence at the Palace. The building is not open to the public, but the Physic Garden behind it, a recreation of an old layout, is well worth a visit at this time of year.

At this time of year the gardens inside the grounds of the Palace of Holyroodhouse are at their colourful best in anticipation of Royal Week, when the monarch will be in residence once again. I remember once being hugely impressed to discover the rose garden at Balmoral was timed to be in full bloom in September, late in the season by normal standards but in perfect time for the arrival of Her late Majesty. As with Trooping the Colour the other day, this year's Royal Week will be The King's first as monarch. Sadly we won't see His Majesty in Canongate Kirk as he won't be here on a Sunday, but he will host the usual round of engagements, audiences, investitures and of course the Garden Party. And there will be the added spectacle of a carriage procession up the Royal Mile for a Service of Thanksgiving in St Giles' Cathedral, in the course of which The King will receive the Honours of Scotland.

Unlike the roses at Balmoral, we've produced this newsletter unusually early this month to accommodate office holidays. Whether you are heading off on holiday, or staying at home, I hope you can get a chance to enjoy some more summer weather and something of a break from the usual routine.

KIRK SESSION UPDATE

On Saturday 3 June the Kirk Session had the privilege and pleasure of meeting for a Planning Day at the Palace of Holyroodhouse. We are very grateful to the Palace staff for their generous hospitality and for giving us such a wonderful opportunity to go out into the Parish and take our work beyond our buildings. Many fruitful discussions were had in an informal atmosphere, away from the Agenda of our ordinary meetings, with a particular focus on pastoral care and our relationship with other congregations and our Parish. This allowed us the opportunity to share ideas, both in small groups and whole-room discussions, which will now be taken forward for further consideration and planning. We also had the opportunity to receive a tour of the Kirk’s former premises - Holyrood Abbey - and to learn more about our history. It is said that one must be mindful of the past if one is to successfully plan for the future and so there was something very appropriate about laying the foundations of our future in the place where our story began, particularly as we consider our 900th Anniversary in 2028. The views of our congregation will be an important part of this process and so do please share your own ideas with an Elder or the Minister. We are also pleased to report that Miriam Weibye will serve as the Kirk’s representative to the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian, succeeding Jane Stewart whom we thank for her valuable service in this role.
