

**Newsletter October 2025** 



For many months now, if not years, members of the congregation and visitors alike have been wondering – and asking – when we're going to do something about the peeling paintwork on the ceiling of Canongate Kirk, and the general scruffiness of the upper reaches of the walls. Well, the answer is soon! It was always our general plan to turn our attention to the interior of the church once we had completed the extensive exterior work on the roof, windows and walls a few years ago. But then the pandemic struck and put paid to our best intentions. Since we reopened and time has gone on, the condition of the ceiling in particular has deteriorated and costs have spiralled, but the Kirk Session have agreed that we cannot delay any longer and must put our house, as it were, in order. We are also conscious that in 2028 we will be marking the 900th anniversary of the founding of the parish with the building of the Abbey at Holyrood in 1128. The last time the Kirk was redecorated was around 1991 to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the opening of Canongate Kirk to replace the Abbey in 1691. With all this in mind an application for permission to proceed was submitted to the Property Committee of the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian and at the September meeting of Presbytery permission was duly granted.

So I can now confirm that we will be going ahead with this major project in the New Year of 2026. It will take at least three months and cost something in the region of £300,000. Thanks to the generosity of the congregation in the past and the careful stewardship of our finance team, we are fortunate to have the financial resources available to meet these enormous costs. But we will have something of a fundraising programme as the coming months go by, to help meet any unforeseen costs and to some extent to replenish our depleted reserves. Suggestions for events are welcome, but at this stage a Gift Day, concert and other gatherings are already tentatively envisaged. The church will be filled with scaffolding (accounting for at least a third of the cost) and we will have to meet in the Harry Younger Hall on Sunday mornings from January to March. It might be a bit tight but at least it will be cosy! We have avoided concert and wedding bookings for the first quarter of the year, and it is a relatively quiet time in the Church calendar, though the aim will be to be back in the Kirk in time for Easter. More details will emerge as the project gets underway, and I'll keep you posted as best I can as together we look forward to the day when we can say with the Psalmist once again, *How lovely is Thy dwelling place, O Lord of hosts, to me.*

### **United Evening Services**

## **Edinburgh 900 Exhibition**

Celebrating the 900<sup>th</sup> anniversaries of both St Giles' Cathedral and Edinburgh, 'Edinburgh's First Burghers' at St Giles' brings together new research of medieval burials first excavated in 1981 to reveal the lives and hidden faces of Edinburgh's medieval citizens. The exhibition also features new lighting designs to project the facial reconstructions of five early Edinburghers, along with a short film featuring interviews with the project team and Cathedral staff, discussing the results and importance of the work to the heritage of the City and the Cathedral. Until 30<sup>th</sup> November. Opening hours: Mon - Fri : 10am - 6pm; Sat : 9am - 5pm; Sun : 1pm - 5pm. Admission is free.
