

## **MINISTER'S LETTER**

There was a particular phrase that caught my attention in a recent BBC TV documentary where The King described his approach to the concept of succession in the monarchy. It was from an old interview given when he was a young Prince of Wales, in which he described his life as being "like a farmer's son." My late father was a farmer's son, but the youngest of three boys. When war broke out in 1939, Dad and his eldest brother joined the Royal Navy and the Army respectively, and the middle brother stayed at home on the farm. In due course his son, my cousin, took it on and eventually his son will too. That's how it works. But I've often wondered how things might have gone if Dad had been too young to go to war, and his big brothers went instead. I suspect that might have made me a farmer's son and these days a farmer in the Borders, tending a different sort of flock, sowing a different sort of seed, reaping a different sort of harvest. And do you know I'm pretty sure I'd just have got on with it and accepted my lot "like a farmer's son."

King Charles might similarly speculate on how things might have gone for him if circumstances had been different. He too could well have become a farmer. But of course there has never been any question over what he would eventually do. His destiny has been set in stone since the moment he was born. Still, amongst all the powerful imagery and symbolism embedded in the elaborate detail of His Majesty's Coronation in Westminster Abbey, I like to think of him metaphorically receiving the keys of the tractor along with everything else presented to him, and "like a farmer's son" following with simple acceptance in the footsteps of those who have gone before. There's a modern harvest hymn that coincidentally but helpfully combines these themes:

Praise God for the harvest of mercy and love, from leaders and peoples who struggle and serve with patience and kindness, that all may be led to freedom and justice, and all may be fed.

Praise God for the harvest, and God save the King!

And on Monday 8<sup>th</sup> May from 10am – 4pm as part of His Majesty The King's coronation initiative The Big Help Out, the Crafting Club will be hosting a Coronation Craft-a-thon to make baby blankets for the Simpson Neonatal Unit. The Craft-a-thon will take place in the church. Lunch and refreshments will be provided. Crafters can join for any part of the day, and all are welcome. #### KIRK SESSION UPDATE

The Kirk Session met in the Harry Younger Hall on the evening of Monday 24<sup>th</sup> April. Thanks were recorded to James Anderson and David Croft for their hard work in producing the Annual Review, and likewise to Jane Stewart who is stepping back from her role as the Kirk's representative to the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian after five years in the role. The decision was made to trial the use of the common cup in the King David Aisle during Holy Communion on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May. Individual glasses will be used for the other aisles, as at present. Do please share any feedback that you have with an Elder as the matter will be revisited at our next meeting in June. In a further return to how things were pre-Covid, from May onwards a collection will be taken up during the service. The Kirk Session was also pleased to welcome the addition of three new members to the Congregational Roll.

#### SUNDAY OFFERINGS

As indicated above, the Kirk Session has agreed to re-introduce our former practice of taking the collection DURING the morning service with effect from Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> May. We are conscious that nowadays many of the congregation give generously by direct means and should certainly not feel obliged to put something in the collection bag as it is passed along

the pew. The contactless machine will remain in place in the foyer but there will no longer be a collection plate beside it.

The Kirk Session has also agreed that at our next celebration of Holy Communion on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May the common cup will be available in the King David Aisle for those who prefer to use it.

# MONTHLY EVENING SERVICE

Our next united service with St Giles' takes place on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May at 7pm. A quartet of singers from the Cathedral choir will be in the gallery. It's worth noting that the 2023 Edinburgh Marathon will be taking place that day and as a result it might be difficult to get around the city centre.

#### STAMPS

Don't forget that we also have an ongoing collection for used stamps. This year's Stamp Project aims to raise funds for The National Evangelical Synod of Syria and Lebanon (NESSL). NESSL employs more than a thousand people including their pastors. The economic crisis in the country and the consequences of the huge explosion in Beirut has struck hard and the Synod is struggling to pay salaries for pastors which range between £100 to £150 per month. The money raised from stamp collections will go towards supporting a pastor for a full year's salary.
