

#### **MINISTER'S LETTER**

Good morning\*. There are always major art exhibitions in Edinburgh in August and this year has been no exception with an impressive retrospective of the work of Glaswegian artist Peter Howson, described as one of the leading figurative painters of his generation. It's entitled "When the apple ripens" and it certainly reflects the colourful fruit of his labours over several decades. In harsh and often brutal images that are characteristic of his work, Howson frequently focusses on the marginalized for his subject, victims of abuse and violence on the streets of his hometown or in the fields of Bosnia, where his experiences as official war artist had such a profound effect on him.

The exhibition also covers his eventual conversion to Christianity with a range of religious paintings that in their own way can be considered quite radical in the 21st century. In a video that complements the exhibition Howson admits that he has lost count of the number of times he has painted Jesus, often in a contemporary setting. And in his own day of course Jesus too focused on the marginalized and overlooked, those on the edge of society, those who would otherwise go unnoticed or ignored.

Many of Howson's paintings seem to be inspired by what St Paul describes in his letter to the Galatians as "the works of the flesh" – among them strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions. But by contrast the fruit of the Spirit – when the apple ripens – the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Lord help us to bear fruit in your service today, and to reach out to those on the edge, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

# OPEN KIRK REPORT by MADALAINE WALLACE

Over the months of July and August I had the pleasure of opening Canongate Kirk to the public every weekday. Each day has brought new visitors from all over the world each with their own questions and personal relationships with the Kirk. Quite a few times I have had visitors requesting information about a distant relative they believe is buried in the kirkyard, and I have had fascinating discussions about these relatives! For instance, descendants of the Boog family (who are buried in the kirkyard) visited in July when they were curating a file of information about their family history, the family informed me that Robert Boog (buried in the kirkyard) made medical instruments that were shipped even to New York! Additionally, some of his medical instruments can be seen in the Surgeon's Museum here in Edinburgh. Several distant relatives of our original benefactor, Thomas Moodie, have visited the Kirk as well—Thomas Moodie's relatives stretch all over the world, as I have spoken to relatives from New Zealand, Canada, and America. An interaction I found particularly interesting was with a woman from America who had traced her family tree back and found that she is a descendant of a Minister of Canongate—specifically, a descendant of John Warden who was the Minister of Canongate Kirk from 1755 to 1764!

Although August is the busiest month for Edinburgh as a whole, it was in July that the Kirk had the most visitors—one week in July saw around four thousand visitors! Many express their gratitude for our extensive collection of translated information sheets. Visitors have included people from all over America, Japan, China, South Korea, Central Europe, Eastern Europe, the Nordic Countries and Canada. However, the Kirk being open Monday to Friday has also allowed Edinburgh locals to visit for the first time—nearly every day a will local drop by and say, "I've lived here all my life and I've never once seen it open!"

The first week I worked in the Kirk was 'Royal Week,' when King Charles III received the Honours of Scotland; in this week quite a few of the visitors who were here for the ceremony dropped by the Kirk—including two Orthodox Jewish men. For them, the military connection the Kirk has was particularly intriguing, they asked questions about the War Memorial Chapel and the Military Colours around the Kirk. For them the military presence within the Kirk was of particular interest, as they told me it is something that their Synagogue would never have. Several times Catholic priests have visited the Kirk, and they often comment on the Catholic-esque structure of the Kirk and the presence of Latin around the interior. On numerous occasions American Baptists and Methodists visit the Kirk and they will often comment on the light shining into the kirk, the Kirk's history, and its *blue-ness*, stating how different it feels to their churches back home in Florida, North Carolina, or Minnesota. Of course, the comments on the blue interior are not limited to Americans, it is one of the most commonly questions asked in Open Kirk—closely followed by "where is Adam Smith buried?" and, for a period of time, "where has Robert Fergusson's statue gone?!"

Working in Canongate Kirk has been a wonderful way to spend my summer, I have been able to learn so much about the history of not just Canongate Kirk, but the City of Edinburgh as a whole; looking through old maps of the city and reading articles and books to be able to pass on information to our visitors. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time here, the people I have encountered, and all that I have learned!

## **OPEN KIRK UPDATE**

The Festival and Fringe are now over but there are still lots of visitors and tourists on the Royal Mile and we would like to keep Open Kirk going for a few more weeks. Madalaine is continuing Monday to Friday in the meantime but there is still scope for volunteers from the congregation to take a turn on Saturdays. It would be particularly good to be open over Open Doors weekend on 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> September. Please sign up in the foyer if you can help.

## ROBERT FERGUSSON

The much admired statue by David Annand at our front gate has been repaired and hopefully, now the Festival is over, it won't be too long before City of Edinburgh Council puts Robert back in his usual place.

## MARGARET BUCHANAN

Still on the theme of historical figures with a Canongate connection, we have been informed that a portrait painted by Sir Henry Raeburn of the wife of The Revd Walter Buchanan is currently on display in the dining room of the National Trust for Scotland's Georgian House in Charlotte Square. Walter Buchanan was minister here during the early decades of the nineteenth century, and overlapped with The Revd Robert Walker, more famously depicted by Raeburn as the Skating Minister! We have a large portrait of Walter on the back wall of the Kirk. His wife Margaret, who died in 1847, was a noted abolitionist in her own right.

Thankfully we featured more positively on the BBC 1 Songs of Praise programme on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> August. The programme was marking the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the death of Sir Christopher Wren, but referred to James Smith, the architect of Canongate Kirk and a contemporary of Wren's. # **CONCERT NEWS**

Our programme of fourteen Festival concerts has come to an end and we won't be Venue 60 again until next year! Thanks are due to our volunteer stewards who welcomed both performers and audience members alike to the church and worked so hard to make each event run smoothly. September is a much quieter month with only one concert - but an important one: *Muse Ukraine – Indomitable Spirit* is a benefit concert to raise funds for British Ukrainian

Aid, a medical charity supporting on-going needs in Ukraine. With an all-Ukrainian music programme, the concert will unveil the long-lost gems of its musical and cultural heritage. Rising above the multitude of difficult historic times, past and present, this music honours the indomitable spirit of those who stand for the basis of humanity- a life in freedom and peace. "Muse Ukraine: Indomitable Spirit" is a project of an ongoing collaboration between two artists, Ukrainian-American violinist Myroslava Khomik and Finnish-British pianist Julia Wallin, who believe that the power of music can serve as the best communicative tool in most challenging times.
