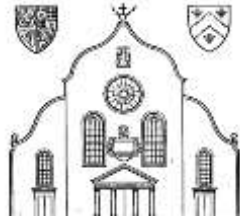

MINISTER'S LETTER

There was a moment during the recent filming of the latest Frankenstein movie outside the gates of Canongate Kirk when the statue of Robert Fergusson was surrounded by actors in period costume – men in boots and black cloaks and top hats, women in bonnets and broad skirts and woollen shawls – and horses and carriages. I'd never seen the statue look quite so contemporary! But it's almost exactly 250 years since Robert Fergusson died on 17th October 1774 at the age of just 24 years old. His death came just a few weeks after his admission to what was known as the Bedlam Hospital, at the end of George IV Bridge, and the tragic young poet was buried in an unmarked grave in Canongate Kirkyard. He hadn't published many poems, but at least one went on to catch the eye and imagination of Robert Burns, who famously described Fergusson as "my elder brother in misfortune, by far my elder brother in the muse." When Burns visited the Kirkyard he identified the anonymous corner where Fergusson had been buried and arranged for it be marked by a headstone bearing a specially written epitaph, which stands to this day on the western side of our churchyard. The etched epitaph consists of one verse, but Burns actually wrote three and the third seems especially apt as we mark the 250th anniversary of Fergusson's death:

*This humble tribute with a tear he gives,
a brother Bard, he can no more bestow;
But dear to fame thy Song immortal lives,
A nobler monument than Art can show.*

Today Fergusson's name lives on, not just in the paving stones of Makars' Court off the Lawnmarket, but in the building that houses the Robert Fergusson Unit of the Royal Edinburgh Hospital in Morningside. His image can be seen in a memorial in St Giles' Cathedral and of course in David Annan's much-admired sculpture set into the pavement outside the Kirk. It's all a far cry from his miserable death and unmarked grave. And a timely reminder of the privilege that is ours as the custodians of what Burns described as "(Scotia's) Poet's dust." We'll mark the anniversary at our morning service on Sunday 13th October and afterwards lay flowers on his grave.
